The Maccabees and their followers recited *Hallel*, psalms of praise to God, as a way to show appreciation for the miracles that God made in defeating the Seleucid Greeks and relighting the Menorah. *Hallel* is still said on Hanukkah today.

Hanukkah is an important holiday in Israel because of its message that a small group of people can show strength against a larger force to defend what they believe is right.
